11	<ul> <li>Any other business</li> <li>a) Traidcraft plc has gone into receivership, which is very sad and a great blow for the fairtrade cause. All is not lost, but it is now much more difficult to source fair trade supplies. Sara is in a group of ex Traidcraft reps ("Fairtraders") that is trying to compile a list of alternative sources. Malcolm Snow will circulate a list when it appears.</li> <li>b) We discussed ways to help local fairtraders – ie. those who have been selling Traidcraft in the area - to network, which might enable them to continue to buy stock. This seems like something we could helpfully coordinate. Malcolm Snow to invite fairtraders to be in touch via CTiS.</li> </ul>	
	Sara is already in touch with the Bures group.  c) "What is Fairtrade?" – Andrew led a discussion of the point of what we are doing. We discussed the abusive and amoral system which is free trade and laissez fair capitalism, and how Fairtrade might begin to challenge that, although this is a limited route and there will be other ways to do this. Sara to spell this out in her article.
